Formative Performance Task

Have a class discussion on ways the school tries to meet our needs.

Graphic organizer (whole group) - Show how each school rule meets our needs.

Have a class discussion on whether the school meets all, some, or none of our wants.

Class discussion on why a school would work harder to meet needs than wants.

Activity Book Activity: Provide drawing pages where students can draw pictures of how the school tries to meet our needs.
