Summative Performance Task	Argument: [Does it Matter How Local Leaders are Chosen?] Construct an argument to answer the compelling question using evidence from sources to support your claim. (Arguments can be in the form of posters, brochures, pictures with sentences, etc.)  Sentence starter: It matters how local leaders are chosen for many reasons. First, some local leaders like are elected by the people.  Second, some local leaders like are appointed by an elected official. For these reasons, it matters how local leaders are chosen because we have a say.  Extension: Give an explanation of what can happen if people disagree with the decisions made by local leaders versus what can happen if people agree with the decisions made by local leaders.  Students should understand that if people disagree with decisions made by local leaders, people may vote for other local leaders at the next election.
Taking Informed	Act: Create a video as a class encouraging people to vote for local leaders. Be sure to include reasons why voting for local leaders is important.
